

Wisconsin AHEC Community Health Internship Program Sites, Summer 2018

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General Information

This unique program links undergraduate and graduate student interns with local health departments, community health centers, tribal health centers, community-based organizations, and other agencies throughout the state to address a variety of public health issues. Projects vary widely to suit interns' interests and abilities. Mentors provide technical support and assistance and facilitate shadowing opportunities to help interns gain an understanding and appreciation of the broad range of public health activities undertaken at the local level.

Students selected for the program are usually undergraduate students in the junior or senior year, or first year health professions, MPH or other graduate students with a strong interest in public health. The program is offered at sites statewide.

AHEC offers two distinct programs, both running from June 3 to July 26, 2019 and providing a stipend of \$2400 for the eight weeks. The **Milwaukee CHIP program** is operated by Milwaukee AHEC, with core activities based in Milwaukee and project sites in Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, and Waukesha counties.

All other Wisconsin locations are included in the **Statewide CHIP program** operated by the AHEC Program Office in Madison. The Statewide program includes a required orientation day in Madison on Thursday, May 31st, with continuing core activities delivered via distance learning.

You may apply to either program, or both, using one online application. If you are interested in Milwaukee CHIP (including sites in Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, and Waukesha counties), you <u>must</u> rank it as one of your top two choices. Project matches are determined by the overall quality of the application, site rankings in the application, and essays. If accepted, you will interview with the site mentor and discuss the proposed project before your placement is confirmed.

In either case, we do our best to match students with their project interest and location preference. **Highlights of recent CHIP project themes** (and examples):

- Grassroots efforts to engage ethnically diverse, low-income community members
- Chronic disease prevention: community physical activity promotion campaign

- Environmental health programs: sampling and analysis of beaches, pools, and wells
- Local policy and program development: conduct community health assessments
- **Health education**: training curriculum for day care providers
- Improving access to healthcare services: development of a free clinic
- Marketing and communication: implementation of social media and videos
- **Research**: survey design, focus groups, statistical methods, literature searches

To be eligible for the CHIP program, applicants must:

- be a Wisconsin resident or student attending a college or university in Wisconsin
- be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- have a GPA of 3.0 or higher
- have completed at least two years of college coursework by June 2019
- have an interest in community health or public health

This is a highly competitive program. Most internships are awarded to current juniors, seniors, or graduate students. **The full application requires:**

- 1) Completion of the online application
- 2) Two letters of recommendation (sent directly to the AHEC Statewide Intern Coordinator)
- 3) A complete set of official transcripts from all colleges/universities attended where you completed 12 credit hours or more. If your current or degree-granting transcript includes transfer credits with grades or GPA for any transfer credits, you do not need to request a separate transcript from the program where you completed the transferred credits.

[Note: Transcripts and letters of recommendation are not required from applicants who have already been accepted into the UWSMPH Path of Distinction in Public Health (POD-PH) program.]

The Application deadline is 8 a.m. Friday, February 8, 2019.

Section I: Statewide CHIP Program Sites

The statewide program is administered separately from the Milwaukee CHIP program. Students attend an all-day orientation in Madison on Thursday, May 31st, 2019. Throughout the summer, Wisconsin AHEC facilitates web-based instruction on community health principles and practice; interns participate remotely from their placement sites. **The Application deadline for is 8 a.m. Friday February 8, 2019.**

Internship Summary:

The Wisconsin Statewide Community Health Internship Program provides students with a real-life experience in the public and community health world. Placements are with health departments, community health centers, tribal health centers, and community-based organizations in Wisconsin.

Each student will work closely with a participating mentor on a community health project. Sites have opportunities for job shadowing a variety of public health positions.

Students may choose their top four internship sites on the online application. The site descriptions are located on the CHIP site description list. The student will be asked to write an essay on their top 2 choices. PLEASE READ THE DESCRIPTION CAREFULLY BEFORE YOU WRITE YOUR ESSAY. This essay is an important part of the site assignment process.

Adams-Friendship Elementary School garden will require maintenance over the summer! This internship will include weeding, watering, planting and harvesting in the school garden. The intern will create a maintenance plan and collaborate with the school and other community partners on how to incorporate the foods that are grown in the garden into the classroom for the elementary school students to learn more about the foods they eat and how they are grown. The intern may have the opportunity to create and run programs in the school garden with the summer school students and engage childcare providers to educate on fresh fruits and vegetables, access and initiating child care gardens at their facility. The intern will also work with the Be Healthy Adams County coalition on other initiatives related to nutrition.

This internship offers a great opportunity to have a variety of different experiences. The intern will manage and maintain the school garden and work outside during the beautiful summer months in Adams County. The intern will connect with community partners to offer garden and nutrition education and work on initiatives that will make an impact long after the internship is over. On off-time, take a hike at Roche-A-Cri State Park or Quincy Bluffs State Natural Area or kayak and swim at the numerous lakes throughout the county.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Knowledge of plants and harvesting/maintaining gardens, ability to work on hands and knees in garden, ability to work independently and with others, good time management skills. Preferred – Health education and nutrition knowledge, experience in coordinating programs for elementary school children.

Important Considerations: This position will require hours mostly during weekdays, Monday through Friday from 8am-4:30pm. There may be a few occasions that weekend or evening hours may be necessary. Access to a vehicle is preferred.

Ashland County, located on the south shore of Lake Superior includes Madeline Island with many Tourist Rooming Houses (TRH) and well water sources. Candidates will understand code requirements for TRH's, perform and generate an inspection report, and enter data electronically. Interns will also collect water samples from required sources, incubate and interpret samples, and document and report results. Candidates are to be consumer friendly and confident of the job that Ashland County is required to perform.

This position involves travel and outside work including ferry trips to Madeline Island, and at times scheduling their own work load. In addition, this position offers exposure to many facets of Environmental Health, including restaurant, retail, pool, festival inspections, and Human Health Hazard investigations. Ashland County has a Level III Health Department with experienced and welcoming staff. The health department, while small staffed, delivers over 27 programs and will provide a well-rounded public health experience to the Intern including exposure to Communicable Disease surveillance and investigation, MCH in-home visitations, Birth to Three, Immunizations, Reproductive and Adolescent Health.

The Intern will increase public education with development of a health-related article for publication locally. Ashland County Public Health lies within the county's Health & Human Services Department, providing an experience of the first-hand interaction between public health and social services.

This internship will provide exposure to the northern-WI climate and culture while experiencing on the job experience to the field of Environmental Health, and a working understanding of the role and responsibilities of a local health department in a large, rural county.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required—Basic scientific equipment use; ability to work independently. Preferred—Public relations skills/consumer oriented; managing work schedule.

Important Considerations: Driver's license and vehicle availability for work-related travel; variable weather conditions especially on the ferry and island.

Internship Summary:

This position will allow you to work with multiple different professions which will provide an opportunity to grow your professional network. Barron County values students. Many of our employees came to us as students, fell in love with public health, and returned as employees. Come spend the summer with us and fall in love with public health!

Barron County is a rural community in Northwestern Wisconsin. Our many lakes, parks and community festivals make this a great place to spend your summer. You will work with our prevention team to prevent and reduce youth and adult methamphetamine, prescription, alcohol, and tobacco abuse. Examples include hosting mock drug room events, consulting with law enforcement and community stakeholders, coordinating and assisting with alcohol and tobacco retail checks and education, creating social medial outreach, and assessing the community climate around drug use / abuse.

You will participate in the Barron County Community Coalition where you will have the opportunity to network with over 200 community partners. We will work with these partners to provide job shadowing opportunities beyond our organization. Past interns have shadowed staff within public health, human services, aging and disability resource center, community organizations, and area hospitals. Staff are welcoming and excited to have you join us for the summer!

The intern will acquire skills in applying current techniques for understanding dynamics of microbial communities and developing strategies for recreational water safety. The intern will also gain understanding of contaminant sources and solutions to improve recreational water quality. The student will learn about environmental Public Health activities designed to prevent a potential illness for water-borne microbial contaminants. The project provides opportunities for enjoying the outdoors by the lakes during field sampling.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Strong oral and written communication skills, ability to work independently. Preferred – Organized, open minded

Important Considerations: Applicants will need a valid driver's license; county vehicles are available for work related travel. In order to meet community availability, limited evening and weekend hours may occur. You will be able to flex off time accumulated outside normal business hours and we do allow a flexible schedule.

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Internship Summary:

Brown County Public Health is proud to offer an Environmental Health Internship to students during the summer of 2019. This internship will provide students with a valuable working knowledge of the roles the Environmental Health Unit has in the preservation of public health and safety. In addition to the fieldwork and job training, students will learn a multifaceted approach to public health through partnership building, community education, and preparedness for health emergencies. Students will work with the Preparedness Coordinator to develop tools and resources for keeping the community prepared in the event of an emergency.

Community engagement is an important component in this position; students will create educational resources and will improve existing initiatives to ensure that the community is informed and aware of healthy opportunities like food safety, water safety, and more. Partnership building and job shadowing are the final topic areas that students will work on. Participation in community events, communication with partners, and engagement during coalition meetings and community gatherings will provide students with this valuable partnership work. By the end of the eight-week internship students will leave with job skills and a breadth of knowledge and experience.

This position is unlike many internships: we have opened up space for a motivated person to create, explore, and absorb as much information they wish. We will not ask interns to do any "busy work". We want our students to get personal and professional development.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Education in Health Sciences, Public Health, or other sciences. Preferred – Passion for food safety and environmental health.

Important Considerations: Access to a vehicle for work-related travel. Proficient in Microsoft programs. Basic knowledge of graphic design. Ability to work occasional evenings and events. Able to work independently.

The project will have two main areas of focus and will primarily be outreach and education. The intern will collaborate with community groups and businesses to distribute "Get Yourself Tested" materials and information. The intern will have the opportunity to implement the agency marketing plan, create materials, and educate the public about STD testing and treatment. The second topic area will be the opioid epidemic awareness campaign. The intern will work with the Community Health Educator to educate the public on the drug abuse crisis in Buffalo County. The intern will also have the opportunity to shadow various job duties of the nurse, environmental health specialist, and WIC.

This is an opportunity to collaborate with local community members, develop their outreach skills to engage the community, and learn about the challenges and opportunities in rural public health.

Internship Summary:

This internship will provide the candidate with a comprehensive introduction to the "day-in-the-life" reality of a rural local health department. This will include but not be limited to involvement in environmental health matters, community-based health education and promotion activities, coalition development and maintenance, family health services, quality improvement/performance management, public health preparedness, and communicable disease prevention and control. A particular opportunity exists for a student who is interested in data review, analysis and quality improvement. The candidate will be given significant opportunity to interact with the entire public health team, its Board of Health and, externally, members of the community.

The Clark County Public Health Department is a dynamic agency that, though relatively small, provides an array of programs/services. As such, you as the student will be given ample opportunity to learn what a comprehensive health department does by taking on projects and shadowing Public Health Nurses, a Jail Nurse, an Environmental Health Specialist, a Health Educator, and the Health Officer/Director as well as interact with Board of Health members.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Experience with MS Word, Excel, Outlook; Good customer service skills; Experience working in a team environment. Preferred – Familiarly with the 10 essential services of public health; Experience working with individuals and groups of varying races/ethnicities; Understanding of health disparities; Data analysis and report writing.

Important Considerations: Access to a personal vehicle for work-related travel; ability to be flexible based on changing priorities.

Internship Summary:

This internship is for the student who likes variety and building relationships. The student will take part in a number of teams and projects focused on improving community health, reducing costs and elevating patient experience. The hospital is a founding member of the Stoughton Wellness Coalition, a partnership with the City of Stoughton, Stoughton Area School District and the Hospital. The student will work about 20 hours a week with Stoughton Wellness Coalition whose mission is to promote healthy lifestyle choices and prevent youth substance use. Projects will include social media review, outreach in the community and policy work with local council members. Job shadowing of Stoughton Wellness Coordinator and attendance at coalition meetings expected. Hospital projects will include video, TV, radio production - focus on assisting with marketing, outreach at community events and assisting with community education programs. Student will work with staff to coordinate and implement Community Health Needs Implementation Plan. Student will also attend department meetings and be part of customer experience team that meets weekly and work on developing a community liaison committee.

Work in a hospital setting that has 98% engaged and satisfied employees, physicians that are over 95% engaged and be part of an environment where patients and community members are the top priority. This internship is an opportunity to build relationships, improve organizational skills and develop strong leadership skills.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required - Microsoft Office software, Communication Skills, Organizational Skills. Preferred: - Attention to Detail, Self-Starter.

This internship will be a little mix of everything! The intern will work closely in collaboration with the Tobacco Prevention and Control Epidemiologist and Policy Coordinator to analyze data, create communication tools and educate on policy throughout the eight-week internship. The intern will have a wide range of opportunities and is able to cultivate projects based on their skills, expertise, and interests. The student will develop an understanding of the breadth of public health work done at the state level and the 10 essential public health services. The student will have opportunities to travel to other parts of the state to meet local coalition coordinators who are using data and working on policy in their communities. Some of the projects in this internship could include: - Identifying data gaps for local coalitions - Using data to create factsheets and other communication tools - Developing communication tools using a health equity lens that highlights groups of people underrepresented in data - Using data to guide policy priorities This experience will provide numerous opportunities for the student to learn from and work with leaders who are doing public health work on the front lines. If the student has interests outside of the project, they are able to meet and shadow other areas of the department, such as maternal and child health, policy and planning, and more!

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – 1) Systems thinking, 2) Communication skills (written, oral, in-person, and electronic communication), 3) Understanding and commitment to racial equity and social justice. Preferred – 1) Data analysis and assessment - using data to address scientific, political, ethical, and social public health issues, 2) Policy development skills, and 3) experience using excel and/or other statistical software such as SPSS, 4) Interest or experience using GIS/mapping technologies to further understand health equity, 5) Knowledge of tobacco products and tobacco policy

Important Considerations: This position requires being at the Department of Health Services building (1 W. Wilson Street) in Madison, which is on bus lines and located downtown. Parking is available but there is a cost associated and is not provided by the host site.

Inland Beach Monitoring and Microbial Risk Management

Project 1: 85% -- Beach Project Job shadowing opportunities: 15%

Internship Summary:

Lakes define the Madison area, conjuring images of beautiful swimmable and fishable lakes. However, occasionally health threats from water contamination become evident. Exposure to enteric pathogens, such as bacteria, viruses and parasites during recreational water activities can cause ear and eye problems and gastrointestinal illness. Exposure to blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) may cause adverse skin and eye reactions, gastrointestinal illness, neurological problems, and even death of animals from skin-, liver- and neurotoxins.

PHMDC monitors Madison and Dane County public beaches during the summer to detect health threats and provide a mechanism to protect the public before undesirable health outcomes occur. The goals are to minimize the likelihood of water-borne disease outbreaks; communicate risk and assure safety during recreational activities. We monitor indicator bacteria and blue-green algae that may cause adverse health effects.

The proposed internship project includes beach water quality monitoring for the following:

- Collect beach samples to assess non-point source E. coli throughout the 8-week period.
- Use rapid monitoring to detect threats from blue-green algal toxins with intensive surveying during heavy blooms.
- Perform data management tasks related to the beach program.
- Evaluate results and communicate potential risk information to the public via website updates.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Skills in microbial sample handling techniques, good quality assurance / quality control skills, attention to detail and ability to work in a team environment

Important Considerations: Occasional work may be done under adverse weather conditions. We have a vehicle available for sampling trips to Madison area beaches.

Internship Summary:

Public Health Accreditation is a movement! 32 states, including the Wisconsin Department of Health, and 15 Local Health Departments in WI have already achieved this recognition. For the last year, PHMDC has been working toward national voluntary accreditation by the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) and is offering the opportunity for interested students to become part of this process. As an intern, students would have the opportunity to work with the leaders and staff throughout the entire health department, but particularly, the Accreditation Coordinator, The Performance Management Team, and the PHMDC Communications Team. Students would develop an understanding of the breadth of public health work done at the local level, the 10 essential public health services, and the national standards and measures required by PHAB. This internship would primarily include the following: - Working with the PHMDC communications team and the Accreditation Coordinator to support the implementation of the "A-Plans" (e.g. Strategic Plan, Workforce Development Plan, Community Health Assessment/Community Health Improvement Plan) - Supporting the Accreditation Coordinator and the Domain Teams with PHAB documentation/evidence collection and organization.

Accreditation is where public health is going – it's a movement! This experience would provide numerous opportunities for students to learn from and work with leaders who are doing public health work on the front lines. Accreditation aims to make sure public health is doing a good job at fulfilling its ever-changing roles like delivering immunizations,

cultivating community partnerships, working on food safety, and addressing big-picture issues like racism. Accreditation is about building systems and processes around everything public health does, to make sure we're coordinated and efficient. Students would be exposed to a considerable range of public health practices; from policy analysis, to environmental health, to direct health care services, to emergency preparedness and response, and much more! Come join PHMDC's accreditation journey and contribute to this national movement toward improving and protecting the health and well-being of people in Madison & Dane County.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Systems thinking. Preferred – Communication skills (written, oral, in-person, and electronic communication with linguistic and cultural proficiency)

Important Considerations: This position would require attending meetings at all three PHMDC locations which are in Madison, on bus lines.

Internship Summary:

Working with the Environmental Health Specialist, the intern will collect well water samples from public facilities and surface water samples from St. Croix County public beaches and tubing waterways. The intern will learn to follow a specific procedure for sampling, shipping, lab submission and data entry. The intern will also do follow-up on animal bites to ensure proper quarantine procedures are followed. The intern will assist in public health nuisance, human health hazard, lead poisoning, restaurant, retail food, and mobile home park inspections. The intern will learn to evaluate and communicate results of inspections and investigations and will participate in enforcement procedures. The intern will learn the importance of accurate and specific yet concise documentation of investigations. If the intern has GIS experience, a project involving geo-locating and mapping Environmental Health Complaints using the counties ArcView GIS program will be developed.

This internship will provide numerous opportunities for exploring the broad scope of a local public health department's many facets. As time permits, the intern will have a choice to focus on specific areas of interest to help enhance their career goals.

St. Croix County is located in the northwest area of the state, located 25 miles east of the Minnesota Twin Cities. The I-94 corridor runs through St. Croix County, and is the major interstate connection to the Twin Cities. St. Croix County is an urban/rural mix (57% rural). We have our urban population residing on the western part of the county and as you move east, it becomes more rural. The population is 84,345, the fastest growing county in Wisconsin, little diversity (95.0% white, non-Hispanic), higher education level than the state average, and a higher median household income--\$69,682.

Both of these factors impact our county health ranking within the state (#2 healthiest out of 72 counties). This work plan has been put together with the intent of enhancing the intern's start in a public health career. It would be a great opportunity for an intern who is excited about the prospect of working autonomously under limited supervision, while at the same time, becoming part of a team of dedicated public health professionals.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – MS Word, Access and Outlook. Preferred skills – GPS.

Internship Summary:

Walworth County will be conducting a Community Health Assessment (CHA) in 2020. This CHA will provide the data that will determine the county's priority areas for the next five years. This project will help prepare for this important assessment by creating an evidence-based work plan and tools. The student will research best practices for community health assessments in rural counties. As a result of that research, they will develop surveys, recruitment materials and an assessment schedule. The intern will also assist with other initiatives that support healthy living. The 5210 campaign focuses on increasing physical activity, fruit and vegetable consumption, and decreasing screen time and consumption of sugary beverages. The student will work with Public Health staff to create a strategic outreach plan, including the development of social media content and other marketing materials. There will also be ample opportunities for the student to job shadow and see how their project interrelates with every program run through Walworth County Public Health.

Internship Summary:

The UW-Whitewater Campus Garden is dedicated to providing fresh, organic produce to the Whitewater Food Pantry while engaging the campus and community in learning more about the importance of local foods in an individual's diet and environmental benefits of eating local and organic. This includes connecting with local organizations focused on health and wellness and connecting disadvantaged citizens to healthy options in our community. One such organization is Working for Whitewater's Wellness (W3), a non-profit organization that makes wellness resources and opportunities accessible to all who live, work, learn, and play in Whitewater, WI. Internship Summary:

Summer recreation provides additional challenges for public safety. We are looking to the AHEC intern for assistance with community health outreach activities, including surveillance of area beaches and pools, and assuring food safety at Farmers Markets and special events. Environmental Health staff will provide direction; opportunities to job shadow; and training on hazardous algal blooms, local groundwater issues, pool chemical testing, beach water testing, health hazard complaint inspections, licensing of public establishments, and basic food safety concepts. Internship Summary:

The CHIP intern will assist survivors of domestic violence/sexual assault (DV/SA) in several ways: by providing education on nutrition, fitness, mental health, and overall well-being; work with survivors in shelter to understand the effects of abuse and trauma; and participate in community and staff education and self-care. The intern will work primarily with survivors in the Family Center shelter as well as participate in outreach activities in the community. Some physical activity will be necessary such as exercising with clients and working in the Family Center produce gardens.

Additional option to work with the local Farmer's Market, assisting with EBT/FoodShare accessibility. Attending community meetings and working with other local organizations such as the UW Extension, YMCA, Healthy People Wood County, the Health Department, and the Hunger Coalition might be included. Time may also be spent assisting staff with other projects relating to public health and overall health of clients, such as the annual United We Can canned food sculpture event. Intern also has the opportunity of completing additional in-house training certificates in a variety of areas including: Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), Trauma Informed Care (TIC), Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, and Alcohol and Other Drugs Abuse (AODA).

Working with survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault can be incredibly rewarding and will provide a unique view into public health. In this position you will have the freedom to be creative and try new things while working with several different aspects of health and wellness. Since non-profit work, and working with survivors of abuse, is different than typical work in the field of health, this is also a great opportunity to find out what direction you would like to take in your career, build your resume and gain first hand experiences.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – General office skills, interpersonal skills, experience/comfort level working with children and individuals suffering trauma. Preferred – Experience working with domestic abuse/sexual assault survivors, writing skills

Important Considerations: The Family Center is a shelter/crisis center, so work can be very emotionally exhausting and could possibly be a trigger for a survivor. The intern chosen for this position will be working directly with survivors on a daily basis, especially children and youth residing in shelter. Hours will vary - the intern chosen will be required to work some evenings and/or weekends depending on events and activities occurring during the internship. The KCDOH Wellness Center is a walk-in services clinic located at Racine-Kenosha Community Action Agency (RKCAA) 2000-63rd Street in Kenosha above the Women, Infants & Children (WIC) program providing prevention services to diverse populations and promoting wellness. Internship Summary:

The CDC calculates that the Hispanic community in the US has unique rates of disease prevalence, including a 50 percent higher likelihood of mortality from diabetes than Non-Hispanic whites. Latinos with diabetes have been found to have higher rates of heart disease related death than those without diabetes. A specific cluster of risk factors for both cardiovascular disease and type 2 diabetes levels is called Metabolic syndrome (MetS). The Aurora Walker's Point Community Clinic (AWP) serves a patient population that is predominantly comprised of Latino patients. Preliminary research within the Aurora Health System as a whole indicates that MetS and its comorbidities are frequently underdiagnosed. As this is also likely the case within AWP, addressing this diagnostic change could have a significant effect on the health of the AWP patient population and impact the need for related interventions. The CHIP intern will examine newly acquired diagnostic data and literature-based interventions in order to plan or implement one strategy over the course of their internship. Depending on the results of preliminary work on the topic, this intervention could have a wide range of possibilities (social media, food security, behavioral approaches).

AWPCC is a wonderfully supportive and interesting place to work. Our patients are global and so are many of the issues they face. A significant part of our mission is to serve as a

teaching facility for many students, residents and life learners. Because we are part of a healing collective (including our clinic, CORE/EL Centro with whom we partner to deliver our patient bodywork and movement classes) and the Healing Center for victims of sexual abuse, the environment here is very integrative and community oriented.

Internship Summary:

Based on a 2015 Community Survey of the Oneida Nation population of southeast Wisconsin, 45% of respondents are considered obese and another 34% are considered overweight. Knowing the impact on overall health of obesity, Southeastern Oneida Tribal Services has made it a strategic priority to build awareness around the topic of obesity and provide programming to address our population. The ages served through our programming range from seven to Elder. Services provided to our population include an awareness campaign and direct services. Direct services may include nutrition education, including Indigenous foods, exercise programs, recreational activities, educational presentations, and more. The placement would take an active role in working weekly with two youth programs and an Elder program, in addition to developing content for direct mail and social media awareness campaigns.

This opportunity will provide a direct relationship with the Native American population of Milwaukee. The placement will work one-on-one with community members and in groups to help address obesity. Weekly recreational activities with youth will keep the pace of the summer quick and exciting.

Additionally, we are expanding our breastfeeding friendly workplace program to focus on childcare sites. From Neighborhood Food Pantry to Home: Impacting Diabetes One Meal at a Time

Project 1: 60% -- Develop FAQ's and other training materials to increase the understanding of community food pantry volunteers about diabetes and the impact of providing diabetes-friendly food selections and easy to use recipes.

Project 2: 15% -- Conduct a needs assessment of small/medium sized Milwaukee food pantries regarding their diabetes client census and their capacity to utilize the Food Pantry Diabetes Rx/Health Shelves diabetes-friendly recipes.

After a basic medical orientation about diabetes and overview of the impact of diet on managing diabetes, the intern will promote the use of the Healthy Shelves Food Pantry Diabetes Rx and recipes with small or medium sized community food pantries. With technical assistance from clinical volunteer experts, the intern will also be responsible to assist in the design and coordination of community training and/or Healthy Shelves demonstrations.

CHIP students over the past several years have built a Microsoft Access Database for the Bread of Healing Clinic, a free clinic on Milwaukee's north side dedicated to helping the working poor. We use that database to apply for grant funding, and to analyze our success of shortcomings in assisting patients to better health. Our latest data entry ended at the end of July, 2017, when the last CHIP student's project ended. Our staff and volunteers are completely absorbed in providing care for our 2000+ patients in our >7000 patient visits per year, so that there has been no time to continue to update and refine the database. The goal for a project this summer would be to update our database and make some revisions in our data entry to reflect some of the areas we want to highlight in our applications for grants. - Most of the student's time will be spent in data entry. - Depending on the student's interest and experience, he/she may participate in patient care at the clinic to get the fullest picture of the patients we serve. - Depending on student's interest and experience, the student may shadow health care professionals who volunteer at the clinic (RN, MD, PT, diabetes educator, pharmacist). - There are 2000 patients' data to enter into the system. -Once entered, new reports will be generated for the clinic to use in funding applications.

This is a clinic where many "staff" are volunteers. Everyone wants to be there! It is a joyful place to work, where the cadre of volunteers works together as a team to serve our patients. We have volunteers (and students) across many disciplines - behavioral health, medical, social services, nutrition. "Wrap-around" care can be provided in this low-resource setting. As any previous AHEC student will tell you, this is a fun- and learning-filled internship.

This is a tremendous opportunity to help in the branding of longstanding programs committed to address underrepresentation within medicine. There is a wealth of published information on efforts to increase the preparation for, admission of, and education of historically underrepresented minority (URM) students in allopathic medical education. Unfortunately, since the 1970's, there has not been a critical mass of Black, Latinx, Native American and Hmong applicants entering into medicine. We have an opportunity to demonstrate outcome data and the overall efficacy of the summer programs in a visual way through this internship position.

Internship Summary:

Tobacco is Wisconsin's leading cause of preventable death and cost the state 4.5 billion annually in health care cost and lost productivity. Each year 2,600 youth will become new smokers and/or users of e-cigarettes. The adult smoking rate in Wisconsin is 17%, the rate Wisconsin's African Americans is 31%, so nearly double the rate in the general population. The Wisconsin African American Tobacco Prevention Network, (WAATPN) works to eliminate tobacco disparities through innovative partnerships. The AHEC intern will support our efforts in 4 key areas - 1) Support our FACT youth (middle and high school students) to engage in peer-to-peer education and advocacy. They will be planning a youth-led legislative breakfast, tabling at festivals and fairs and filming a menthol education video in the community. 2) Implement a resident survey in public housing to help gain a better understanding of the impact of the HUD smoke-free housing policy that went into effect in July 2018, 3)Collect data through the Wisconsin Retailer Assessment Program to assess the tobacco retailer environment in Milwaukee and 4) support the WAATPN Single Cigarettes Subcommittee and tobacco retailers in their effort to comply with laws that prohibit the sale of single cigarettes.

This internship will provide you with an eclectic opportunity to support an array of projects from helping high school students develop a community-based video to educate on the targeting of tobacco companies for menthol products in low-income African American communities, to documenting product placement in local tobacco retailer shops. This internship is ideal for someone who is creative, loves educating others and wants to make a difference at the individual and community levels.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Word-processing, strong interpersonal communications, ability to work as part of a team, adequate to strong presentation skills. Preferred – Ability desired to work with all segments of the population, youth 7-12th grade, African Americans, low income, small business owners, faith-based, etc.

Important Considerations: During the summer hours some of our events are weekend and/or after hours. We often table at community events and festivals as part of our outreach activities.

Internship Summary:

Availability of, and opportunities for, recreation and leisure-time activities are social determinants of public health. The natural environment, inclusive of its ability to increase climate change resiliency, is also an important physical determinant of health. Local beaches, therefore, are important from a human health perspective beyond the avoidance of clinical illness. For this project, interns will collect samples from designated public beaches along the shores of Lake Michigan, associated tributaries and/or storm water outfalls to assess microbial pollution levels, perform laboratory analyses, enter results into a comprehensive statewide database, conduct pollution surveys and notify the public about current water quality conditions. This is a multi-agency/multi-jurisdictional WI DNR sponsored effort, extending from Saint Francis (Milwaukee County) to Pleasant Prairie (Kenosha County), designed to help municipalities in SE WI achieve the recommended goal of having swimmable beaches available to the public 90 - 95% of the time. This internship will allow the participant to enhance their: organizational and time management skills, proficiency in basic laboratory techniques and computer data entry/database management skills. Interns will gain an appreciation for environmental aspects of public health. Participants will also have the opportunity to work with other graduate/undergraduate students from a variety of academic disciplines and universities.

Monitoring of surface water is necessary to prevent transmission of waterborne disease. Thus, ensuring regulatory compliance and promptly notifying the public when dangerous conditions exist is very important, having ramifications for both public health and safety. Natural resources, such as beaches, are important sources of revenue and economic development opportunities in coastal communities. No or low-cost outdoor recreational venues also provide equitable access to activities which are important promoters of physical and mental health as well as enhancing quality of life. Coastal areas, such as beaches, are also often the first line of defense in shoreline protection during adverse weather events. Thus beaches are not only popular recreational venues but touch on all three pillars of sustainability. This opportunity will allow interns to gain an appreciation of the environmental aspects of public health and how they fit within a larger municipal framework.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Good organizational & time management skills. Preferred – Laboratory and/or field sample collection experience

Internship Summary:

Environmental health practice encompasses many aspects of public health, including housing, food services/supply, recreation, natural resource management and the reduction of hazards within our community. Sampling and testing of prepared foods is one of the most important ways to prevent foodborne illness. While food spoilage or contamination is well recognized, many may not associate the potential for disease transmission with frozen products such as dairy desserts and ice. However, documented foodborne illnesses have resulted from improper storage, maintenance and safe handling of these products. The intern assigned to this project will work closely with a registered sanitarian to collect soft serve ice cream and ice samples for testing at the Racine Health Department Laboratory, issuing subsequent orders should they fail to meet state standards. Interns will also have the opportunity to job shadow and observe other important aspects of environmental health, as well participate in our storm drain placarding program (a public education/information effort to improve surface water quality). This internship will allow the participant to enhance their: organizational/time management skills and computer data entry/database management skills. Interns will gain an appreciation for environmental aspects of public health.

Skills and Experience Needed: Required – Good organizational & time management skills. Preferred – N/A
