

AHEC Scholars







Regional AHEC Centers

Wisconsin AHEC offers a variety of education and training programs through our 7 Regional AHEC Centers in partnership with academic institutions, health care systems and centers, and community-based organizations across Wisconsin's 72 counties.

An 8-week summer internship experience for college students to serve with local health departments, community health centers, and community service organizations throughout Wisconsin. Our 2023 Community Health Internship Program (CHIP) cohort included 104 students from 33 academic institutions.




